Hot Chips at Stanford University

The fifth annual *Hot Chips* conference will be held at Stanford University in Palo Alto (CA) on August 8–10. Sponsored by the IEEE, the conference includes presentations on a variety of processor designs. The high-performance session features two new processors: Silicon Graphics' TFP and a BiCMOS PA-RISC processor from Hitachi. Other presentations cover the PowerPC 601, the DECchip 21066, the PA7100LC, and the R4200. The conference also discusses graphics and video processors as well as some leading-edge research projects. On Sunday, there will be seminars on cache memories and new DRAM designs.
