Lower Your Energy in San Diego

Sunny and relaxing San Diego is the perfect spot for the inaugural **Symposium on Low-Power Electronics** (SLPE) on October 10–12. Sponsored by the IEEE, the conference includes presentations of 38 technical papers from a variety of academic and industry sources, all discussing design techniques for low-power systems. Topics range from a presentation of Motorola's low-power version of the 68040 to a discussion of compiler techniques that reduce the power required to execute code. On Monday evening, a panel will examine the design of a hypothetical portable communicator for 1996.

Neural Networks in Paris (not Nîmes)

Covering industrial applications for neural networks, **Neuro-Nîmes '94** will take place on October 10–14. For the first time, the conference will be held in Paris rather than its traditional location of Nîmes (France). The conference discusses design tools and methodology for neural networks along with typical applications where they can be useful. The first two days consist of tutorials, while the remainder of the week features presentations of papers from academic and industry sources as well as a vendor exhibition. All presentations will be in either English or French with simultaneous translation.

Attendance at the conference costs FF 5,500 (about US\$1,000) for the three days; student discounts are available. The tutorials are priced at FF 2,500 (US\$460) for one day or FF 4,500 (US\$830) for both days. The vendor exhibition is free of charge.
